Tuesday- During Zoom Class Instruction:

Focus Skill: Character, Setting, and Plot:

Students will read pages 542-543 and then the teacher will model how to identify the characters, setting, and plot.

Introduction of Robust Vocabulary Words: Class will go through the list of words, its explanations, and pronunciations.

Wednesday- During Zoom Class Instruction:

Reinforce the Focus Skill: Character, Setting, and Plot: The narrative elements, characters, setting, and plot events are found in every story.

- The **characters** are the people or animals in a story.
- The **setting** is **when** and **where** a story takes place.
- The **plot** is the series of **events** in a story. It begins with a **conflict** and ends with a **resolution**.
- All of these elements work together to shape a story.

Students will then complete **Practice Book page 123**.

Comprehension Strategy: Review Story Structure:

- Characters, setting, and plot events are common to all stories.
- **Story structure** shows how the plot of a story is organized into a series of events.

 Using story structure helps readers understand what is happening in a story and why.

Building Background for "Because of Winn-Dixie": Students will read a story about a girl who moves from a city to a small town in Florida.

Develop Concepts:

- In small towns, there is usually only one library and one post office. Because the town is small, most people know each other.
- Older people in the town often enjoy telling stories about things that happened in the town long ago.
- Long ago, many small towns were surrounded by wild, undeveloped land. Wild animals lived near many small towns.

Discuss Realistic Fiction: Students will read the genre information on page 546. They will look at the photograph on page 546 and 547 and identify details in the photograph that make the characters and setting seem realistic.

Genre Features:

- The genre is **realistic fiction**.
- The text has a main character who overcomes a challenge.
- The **text details** and the character's **real-life problems** help the reader picture the setting.

Students will use **story structure** to keep track of the characters, setting, and plot events while reading the story.

- The main word in the predicate of a sentence is called a **verb.**
- Most verbs tell what the subject of the sentence does.

Main Verbs:

- The verb in a sentence can be made up of two or more words. This is called a **verb phrase**.
- A sentence's **main verb** tells what is happening in a sentence.
